# Multicultural Health Week (MHW)



### What is Multicultural Health Week (MHW)?

MHW has been held annually since 2009 to raise awareness of health issues experienced by culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) communities and ways of addressing these issues. Multicultural Health Week is funded by the NSW Ministry of Health (MoH) and coordinated by the NSW Multicultural Health Communication Service (MHCS).

### What is the theme of this year's MHW?

The theme of MHW 2022 is **Cancer Screening**. MHCS has partnered with Cancer Institute NSW in promoting the 3 national screening programs: Breast Screening, Cervical Screening and Bowel Cancer Screening.

### What are the aims of MHW 2022?

With the tagline 'Cancer Screening Saves Lives', Multicultural Health Week 2022 aims to:

- o Increase awareness of the three national cancer screening programs
- o Increase access to multilingual health resources to support participation in the three cancer screening programs

We work towards this through:

- Media and social media campaigns
- o Engaging with health service providers and partners organisations across NSW Health
- Providing community grants

# What is cancer screening?

Screening is an important part of looking after your health. Cancer screening involves simple tests that look for early signs of cancer, or the conditions that cause cancer. Screening tests can find cancer before you can see or feel any changes to your body. When you find cancer early, it is easier to treat successfully. In Australia, there are three national screening programs. These are for breast, bowel and cervical cancers.

# **Breast screening**

- Women aged 50–74 should have a mammogram (also called a breast x-ray) every two years.
- A mammogram is the best way to find breast cancer before it can be seen or felt.
- It's important for all women aged 50–74 to screen, because most women diagnosed with breast cancer do not have a family history.
- Mammograms with BreastScreen NSW are free. A doctor's referral is not needed.

### What to do?

- To make an appointment call 13 20 50. Call 13 14 50 to speak with an interpreter.
- You can also book an appointment or access in-language information at www.breastscreen.nsw.gov.au







# **Cervical screening**

- Women aged 25–74 should have cervical screening every five years
- You can book a Cervical Screening Test with your local doctor or nurse
- Some doctors provide this for free. You can ask about the cost when you book an appointment
- Cervical cancer can be prevented by having the Cervical Screening Test. This is because it looks for an infection called human papillomavirus (HPV), which causes cervical cancer.
- There are now two options for Cervical Screening Tests. One option is to have a doctor or nurse collect the sample. The other option is self-collection. This is a vaginal swab usually done in a private space at the doctor's surgery or clinic. Both options are equally effective and safe.

### What to do?

- Call 1800 627 701 to check when you are due for a Cervical Screening Test, Call 13 14 50 to speak with an interpreter
- Book an appointment with a doctor or nurse. You can ask for a female doctor or nurse to do the test

- The bowel cancer screening test is quick and simple to do in your own home


- Use your bowel screening kit when it arrives in the mail



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
