

Over Toilet Aid

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What is an over toilet aid?

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An over toilet aid raises the height of your existing toilet to make it easier to get on and off. The arm supports allow you to push up to stand and use a support when sitting.

When should I use an over toilet aid?

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An over toilet aid can be used if you are feeling unsafe, weak or unbalanced when getting on or off a toilet. Please call your local community service team or speak to your doctor about a referral to an Occupational Therapist. An Occupational Therapist will recommend you to use an over toilet aid if necessary.



How should an over toilet aid be adjusted to fit?

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The over toilet aid should be adjusted to suit you and allow ease of transfer and correct posture.

- 1. Lift up or remove existing toilet seat
- 2. Place the over toilet aid over your toilet
- 3. Your hips should be slightly higher than your knees whilst sitting on the chair
- 4. Press the silver button on each chair leg and slide the legs up and down for correct height

How should I use the over toilet aid?

How should I use the over toilet aid?

- 1. Before you sit, walk backwards until you feel your seat at the back of your legs
- 2. Hold onto the arm rests on either side and slowly sit down
- 3. Ensure your hips and knees are level and your feet are on the floor when seated

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How should I care for the over toilet aid?

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- 1. Regularly check the rubber stoppers on the bottom of the chair legs. If worn or cracked replace them immediately
- 2. Clean the over toilet aid using mild soap and water or non-abrasive cleaner
- 3. Let the over toilet aid dry
- 4. Ensure regular maintenance. Report any faults or breakages to the equipment loan pool office immediately
